We use classical texts for our central narrative and employ a variety of performance modalities to create a fully immersive experience. Project history includes: *Ondine* at Sutro; *Macbeth* at Fort Point; *The Odyssey* on Angel Island State Park; and *Hamlet* on Alcatraz.

From We Players: HEROMONSTER is a very different animal for our company. Our hallmark large-scale, outdoor site-integrated theatre productions employ somewhere between 30 and 60 performers, artisans, and stage crew, and usually cover dozens of acres of National Park land. This project is housed completely indoors and features only three performers, yet is still

rich with poetic imagery and inspired by classical texts of epic dimension. Fundamentally driven by image and theme (as opposed to story and character), the piece has emerged through deep investigation of heroism and monstrosity. With this project and other works of this scale, we aim to build powerful theatrical events that are more flexible and can be adapted to a variety of spaces, including intimate indoor environments.

HEROMONSTER is the first phase of a larger exploration and development process. Subsequent phases of this work will include collaborations with the renowned dance theatre company inkBoat and masters in the improvised music scene, the Rova saxophone quartet. Throughout, multiple translations of the ancient anglo-saxon poem Beowulf serve as a jumping off point, igniting inspiration and helping to inform our understanding of heroes and monsters, where they come from, and where and how they currently live among us.

Ava Roy founded We Players in 2000, and serves the company as director/producer/performer. She is an alumna of Stanford University where she earned her BA, 2003. Since 2008, Ava has pioneered unique partnerships with both the National Park Service and California State Park system, at sites such as Alcatraz, Angel Island, Fort Point, Hyde Street Pier and Sutro

Baths. Her practice highlights historical and natural treasures and encourages new ways of experiencing and appreciating these places.

Nathaniel Justiniano is an actor/creator, director and teacher, as well as the founder of Naked Empire Bouffon Company where he has created and performed outrageously satirical physical comedies derived from today's tragedies since 2009. He teaches and directs a wide range of performance-based skills and styles including bouffon, physical theater, clown, playwriting, comedy, improvization, and acting. He holds an MFA in Physical Theatre from Dell'Arte International.

Charlie Gurke is in his 5th year as music director for We Players, a collaboration that began with Hamlet on Alcatraz in 2010. A saxophonist and composer adept in many styles, he can be heard performing with some of the Bay Area's best jazz and latin musicians. He is on faculty at Laney College in Oakland, where he directs the jazz ensembles and teaches theory and jazz history. Charlie was recently awarded 'best musical score' by Theatre Bay Area for his work on We Players' Macbeth at Fort Point. See his site at gurkestra.com for more!

Steve Adams is active both as a composer and performer on saxophones, flutes and electronics. Steve is best known as a member of the Rova Saxophone Quartet, with whom he has played for over twenty five years. Steve has appeared on more than fifty recordings, and has five recordings as leader or co-leader on the 9 Winds and Clean Feed labels. He received a California Arts Council Fellowship in 2000 and teaches at Mills College.

Our Mead-Hall: For We Players, Place is a character. Locations have distinct energies, personalities and even desires. In the poem Beowulf, King Hrothgar's great hall of Herot functions as an important cultural institution that provides light and warmth, food and drink - a place for singing, story-telling and safety. The mead-hall served as a place of refuge within a

dangerous and precarious external world - a world continuously threatened by attacks of neighboring peoples and wild beasts of the great northern forests. The mead-hall was also a place of community, where traditions were preserved and loyalty was rewarded. This is where legends were created and perpetuated, reputations were built, fame broadcast, and history written through the telling of it.

Built during the Korean War, the Fort Mason Center Chapel is one of only two remaining military chapels left in the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. Ten beautiful stained glass windows, which depict several Army branches, the twelve Apostles and eight Hebrew prophets, line both sides of the aisle. Inlaid wood Army insignias adorn the front of the choir loft. Chaplains of all faiths provided services for military members and their families until 1997, when it became part of the Park. While available for private rental, the chapel is now generally closed to the public. We Players is thrilled to bring our audiences into this well-crafted space. Our mead-hall of Herot, like the chapel, is a sanctuary, a refuge for the tired and a place for rituals that support community.
